Presentation

The BSc in Economics presents a solid theoretical formation which allows a deep understanding of economic phenomena in their macro, micro, real and monetary, regional/national and international dimensions, in domains such as production, consumption, distribution, welfare, accumulation and development which enables the acquisition of instruments to an understanding to the analysis of reality. It puts at the students disposition a wide set of knowledge applied to the firms/businesses realities. The BSc contains a balanced curriculum between "knowledge" and "how to do". The teaching methodologies promote autonomous, individual and collective work, and also the development of written and oral capabilities (including in English), the adaptation to different cultural geographical frameworks, or the individual and social responsibility, which allows also to foster citizenship. Presentation

The University of Évora offers, since the year 2014/2015, a BSc in Applied Mathematics to Economics and Management. Until that moment there was only another one BSc with a similar formation, even though there is a long tradition in Europe. This undergraduate formation achieves a strong combination of mathematics and statistics and basic solid knowledge in economics and management. One aims that the graduates of this course obtain not only knowledge in mathematics, but are equally capable of using them in the resolution of economics and business/management problems to make informed decisions, making possible new approaches, applicable to a labour market in constant mutation.

This is a type of flexible formation, which allows adding value to any BSc, allowing him a qualification with high degree of employability. The undergraduate course is based by a collaboration of three departments and two schools of the University of Évora School of Social Sciences (Department of Economics and Department of Management) and School of Science and Technology (Department of Mathematics), taking into advantage the formation and research of the entire faculty in these areas

Presentation

The MSc of Economics aims essentially to foster a set of knowledge in the area of economics, which allows to complement the undergraduate formation, thus enabling further the possibilities of employability and your future career. The course is more focused on Economic Analysis. It aims at giving general capabilities in Economics, thus stressing the research activities and aiming the progressing towards the 3rd cycle, through a strong articulation with the PhD Plan in Economics.

The conclusion of the degree can be obtained by internship report or research project report to the ones, which want to do more applied work (there is a regulation setting the rules for these projects).

Thus the MSc in Economics allows to reconcile theory and practice in an excellency framework, thus enabling the full employability of the graduates either in a day-to-day practice, or in activities of more advanced research in the core area of economics.

CEFAGE, Center for Advanced Studies in Management and Economics, to whom most of the faculty belong to and is a strong backbone and quality guarantee of the teaching and research abilities of all the faculty.

b) Specific Requirement Entries to the Msc:

There can apply to the MSc in Economics both holders of the BSc in Economics or with another BSc in a compatible area. In the regulations the MSc is also destined to:

The holders of any academic degree of first cycle, according to the Bologna Process for any adherent state to the process;

The holders of any academic degree to whom the Scientific Council of the School of Social Sciences recognized as a degree of Bsc;

The holders of a scientific, scholar and professional capacity for a Master of Science, which can be approved by the Scientific Council.

Professional Internships and Job Market Placement

The graduates of the MSc in Economics are able to develop advanced functions in international national, regional organizations, in firms, and also to pursue research in their area of specialization. Namely the Portuguese Competition Authority (AdC, ANACOM), in commercial

and investment banking, and Central Banking (BdP, ECB) and other regional European Organizations (Regional coordination Committees or other organs of local government) or local (Municipal Halls), besides firms according to their specialization.

The graduates will have capabilities their technical and specific functions of the economic areas, namely the impact assessment of public policies, econometric analysis, general equilibrium models and/or applied functions in firms connected to regions, to Europe, and Internationalization, equally in banking or sector banking, from the user perspective, the employer or the regulator.

Presentation

The MSc pretends to reply to the needs human resources formation with simultaneous capabilities in the technological areas of economics and management, which in this case stress the environment and natural resources sustainability and planning and agri-business.

To understand and solve the problems of interdisciplinary nature and to propose innovative and sustainable solutions facing the different challenges of different organizations, which can be expected as a result of learning.

The MSc in Applied Economics and Management is destined specially for BSc non-economist or non-managers, which intend a complementary formation and more specialized in the scientific area, in an applied perspective and focused on specific domains.

Admission Requirements

a) Access conditions leading to the degree of Msc:

According to Decree-Law 17° of DL 74/2006.

b) Specific Access Requirement Conditions:

Holders of the BSc degree (or legally equivalent) preferably coming from the agronomic areas and natural sciences; 2. Holders of an academic degree abroad in the framework of the Bologna Process or adherent to the Bologna process; 3. Holders of an academic degree to whom the scientific council of the School of Social Sciences; 4. Holders of a curriculum scientific vitae which attests the ability to get the MSc in accordance with the scientific council.

I.Capacity to articulate the productive system on the agri-business to do the economic and financial assessment; to establish and evaluate the strategies of development and operations at various levels of agri-business; to project and manage the productive system and production system and control system in the agribusiness firms.

II.Economic assessment of environmental goods; economic analysis of natural resources and environmental goods; policy analysis of their impact on environment and on the exploration of natural resources.

Presentation

This course provides advanced knowledge in the Financial Economics and Monetary Economics areas, developing complementary capabilities to the first cycle formation; it provides specialized knowledge to professional people connected to financial products and markets and financial institutions; it prepares top executives in firms connected to financial areas in any branch and activity sector; it fosters students to study scientific methodologies and start to do research with recent techniques.

Admission Requirements

a) Access conditions leading to the degree of Msc:

According to Decree-Law 17º of DL 74/2006.

b) Specific Access Requirement Conditions:

The candidates should preferably have a degree in Economics, Management, Finance, Mathematics or Engineering. Candidates of other scientific areas may also apply on the basis of professional and personal skills of recognized quality.

Job Market and Job Market Placement

Banking and insurance; other institutions and financial societies; financial heads (CFOS); financial managers or other technicians connected to the financial area in any entrepreneurial branch; financial market hedgers and funders and monetary authorities - Central Banks.

The course is recognized by the Ministry of education for the purposes of teaching career promotion as according to Decree Law/Portaria 344/2008 of 30th April.

Presentation

The Masters in Public Policies and Projects (M3P) aims to strengthen the academic and professional competencies of candidates with diversified background in the area of knowledge which combines the design and implementation projects of different nature, public policies, and organizational strategy. The M3P seeks to combine knowledge and analysis tools of diverse nature to respond to this combination of skills, and provide an advanced training, anchored in up-to-date and eminently applied scientific knowledge, to strengthen the ability of understanding, intervening and decision makings of those whose professional activity involves or is related to the construction, testing, implementation and / or evaluation of plans, projects, initiatives, policies, strategies, of public or private nature. The M3P also aims to stimulate the ability of students to analyse, assess and critically evaluate problems related to the course scope, and their research capacity. Qualified teachers ensure the quality of teaching and the classes take place in a building full of history and equipped with modern means of communication and teaching.

Admission Requirement Conditions

a) Access conditions leading to the degree of Msc:

According to Decree-Law 17º of DL 74/2006.

b) Specific Access Requirement Conditions:

Even though candidates holding a first degree in Economics or Management are natural candidates for this master's programme, an increasing number of professionals holding different academic backgrounds carry out activities in the area of the course objectives. Thus, this master's programme admits candidates holding a bachelor's degree (or any legally equivalent degree) in any scientific area.

Job market and Job market placement

The M3P course is thought for those who carry out their professional activity in companies, central and regional public administration bodies, local government, local development associations, consultants, regional tourism institutions, associations and institutions alike, and take part in the design, implementation and evaluation of plans, projects, strategies, initiatives or policies of public or private nature, including filling in applications for EU/national funding programmes.

Presentation

The Master in International Relations and European Studies is an interdisciplinary programme that offers an in-depth analysis of the key actors, structures and processes that are shaping global politics. During the first year, the core of the programme introduces major issues and approaches to the study of international politics with a particular focus on the European Union both as an emergent polity and as an actor in a globalized world. The classes are designed to respect a careful balance between the theoretical and practical elements of the two core fields, in order to give the students a wide range of transferable skills essential both at the academic and at the professional level. In the second year the students are asked to write a supervised dissertation that allows them to further research and to apply knowledge and skills to a particular area of interest within the IR or the European Studies fields in line with their career aspirations.

Admission Requirement Conditions

a) General Entry Requirements:

According to Decree-Law 17° of DL 74/2006.

b) Specific Access Requirement Conditions:

The MSc in International Relations and European Studies welcomes students from a fairly diverse range of academic backgrounds. Applicants to the MSc must hold a degree of the first cycle (bachelor degree) or a legal equivalent. Each application will be considered on its academic merit. Admission preference will be given to applicants holding a degree in political sciences, and other social sciences, such as economics and law. Besides these general entry requirements, applicants should consult the selection criteria published each year.

Organic Units: Institute for Advanced Studies and Formation (UE)/ University of Beira Interior

Duration: 8 semesters

European Credit Transfer System: 240 ECTS (180 dissertation)

Presentation

This program has the following objectives: to develop the capacity of conducting independent research; to improve scientific and technical skills (analysis, evaluation, planning) in the field of economics with the aim of preparing for high-skilled employment; to consolidate knowledge in the basic areas of economics (macroeconomics, microeconomics and econometrics); and to provide specialized training in any area of economics.

Admission Requirement Conditions

a) Access conditions to the degree of Doctor (PhD):

Defined in the article 30º of the Decree Law DL 74/2006, revised by the Decree Law nº 3/2016 of 13th September.

b) Specific Requirement Admission conditions:

1. The applicants will be accepted in "PLAN A" (PhD Programme with Lectures and Courses) students which fulfil the general conditions of article 30º of Decree-Law DL nº 74/2016 revised by Decree-Law nº 63/2016 of 13th September.
2. The applicants of "PLAN B" of the programme (programme without formal lectures) will be accepted with a minimum of "Good" (14 points out of 20) both in Licenciatura/BSc and MSc in Economics.
3. Exceptionally, applicants of "PLAN B" (without lectures) can be accepted with a minimum of both "Good" (14 points out of 20) both in a Licenciatura/BSc and MSc in areas considered relevant by the Scientific Course Board.

Job Market and Job Placement

We aim at preparing highly skilled researchers able to develop their activity in various areas: academia, banks and insurance companies, consultancy, private enterprises.



RESEARCH CENTERS

Center for Advanced Studies in Management and Economics

The Centre for Advanced Studies in Management and Economics (CEFAGE) of Évora University was created in 2006, having as mission to produce and disseminate scientific research (and its application) in different domains of Economics and Management. From 2009 on CEFAGE has been funded through the Portuguese Foundation for Science and Technology (FCT). CEFAGE has been consistently assessed by the FCT as a top research centre, being considered "Excellent" and "Very Good" respectively in the 2009 and 2014 FCT's external evaluations. Since 2013, CEFAGE has an interinstitutional collaboration, with new branches at the University of Algarve, University of Beira Interior, and at the University Nova of Lisbon (School of Technology and Science).

CEFAGE has currently 49 integrated members, all publishing at the highest level in international peer reviewed research journals. CEFAGE's activities are organized into four sub-groups of research: "Industrial Economics and Strategic Management", "Econometrics, Statistics and Operations Research", "Finance" and "Labour Economics, Regional Economics and Macroeconomics". The members of CEFAGE are also responsible for the PhDs in Economics (U. Évora and UBI) and Management at the University of Évora.

Institute of Mediterranean Agricultural and Environmental Sciences

The Institute (ICAAM) is a research unit of the University of Évora created in 1991. The Centre is funded by the Portuguese Foundation for Science and Technology (FCT), which ranked it with the grade of "Very Good". Located at Mitra campus, it has 23 labs and other infrastructures, such as experimental units and agricultural greenhouses. ICAAM is based on a multidisciplinary team philosophy, having as principal aim to attain excellence as a research unit and to be recognized as a leading centre on the agriculture of the Mediterranean area, both at national and international level.

The main expected result of its activity would be the capacity to answer, in an integrated way, to the social, economical, and technical needs of the agriculture areas, preserving at the same time the natural resources and the environmental quality of the Mediterranean region.

ICAAM is fully equipped for the organization and implementation of integrated and transdisciplinary programmes; to implement activities of advanced education design to consolidate "critical mass" in Science; to establish synergies with national and European programmes, as well as with international networks.

The ICAAM structure includes 7 research groups. Each research group is led by a PhD and includes other PhDs, Post-docs researchers, PhD candidates, MSc candidates, and BScs (research technicians). Within each research group there can be teams assigned to specific lines of research.

ICAAM is composed by 125 researchers with a PhD, and 39 non PhD researchers.

Centre for Research in Political Science

The Centre for Research in Political Science (CICP) is a research unit that is part of the Portuguese Foundation for Science and Technology (FCT) network. Ranked as "Excellent" by an FCT international panel, CICP brings together researchers from different universities, but that are all affiliated in two institutional branches one based in the University of Minho and the other at the University of Évora.

Dedicated to the study of political and social phenomena, as well as to the current global dynamics, CICP produces top interdisciplinary research in these domains. It includes 33 integrated researchers, that although holding PhDs in different areas of knowledge and science share research interests within the scientific field of political science, and several collaborators. The branch of Évora has 16 PhDs integrated members, of which 6 are part of the Department of Economics.
